## Coalition of Stratham Partners Offer 3<sup>rd</sup> Year of Community-wide MLK Celebration

*SMS Student Showcase and Lecture Among Event Offerings*

STRATHAM- For the third year, a coalition of Stratham organizations is ensuring a meaningful acknowledgement and celebration of the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday in Stratham.

The federal holiday and state observance of Dr. King's birthday is an opportunity to remember King's contributions, including his dedication to the fundamentals of vibrant community connections. Inspiration this year comes from Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's TED Talk, "The Danger of a Single Story," which emphasizes the importance of listening to many stories and how it is through our different stories that we learn more about each other and make our community stronger.

This year's offerings include a Stratham Memorial School Student Showcase kick-off event on January 16<sup>th</sup> followed by film screenings, book discussions for adults and children, and concluding with a January 23<sup>rd</sup> lecture by Dr. Kimberly Alexander Director of Museum Studies and Senior Lecturer in the UNH History Department to be held at the Stratham Community Church.

Dr. Alexander's teaching includes the remarkable story of Ona Judge Staines and the lecture and discussion will include Ms. Staines escape from the Executive Mansion in Philadelphia – home to President George Washington and Martha - to Portsmouth, her years of living in Greenland and her recently learned ties to Stratham.

The inspiring struggle for freedom by Ona Judge is the topic for the latest *Postcard from Stratham* by the Stratham Historical Society.

***Never Caught: The Story of Ona Judge George and Martha Washington's Courageous Slave Who Dared To Run Away, -Young Readers edition***

Join us for a discussion of the young readers' account of Ona Judge Staines, who ran away from the household of George Washington. Born a slave in Mount Vernon, Judge escaped to New Hampshire when she was 22 year old. This surprising behind the scenes look at the relationship of slavery to one of America's first families, and the story of a brave woman in the 1700s, echoes through the years to the Civil Rights Movement of the 50s, 60s and even today.

***African American Soldiers and Sailors of New Hampshire During the Revolution***

Prohibited from serving in military units and largely considered "undesirable elements," how is it that African-American soldiers came to fight for the cause of liberty, even when their own personal liberty was not guaranteed? Glenn Knoblock examines the history of African-American soldiers' service during the war, including how and why they enlisted, their interaction with white soldiers, service on the battlefields, how they were perceived by the enemy and the officers under whom they served, and their treatment after the war.

***Never Caught, The Washingtons' Relentless Pursuit of Their Runaway Slave, Ona Judge (Erica Armstrong Dunbar, 2017) – [Link for more info.](#)***

Nearly 50 years after her break for freedom, Ona Judge Staines (1773-1848), a runaway slave from the household of the first president of the United States, shared her harrowing account in the May 1845 issue of the *Granite Freeman*. In "Never Caught", a startling, well-researched slave narrative published in 2017, Erica Armstrong Dunbar shares Judge's story in more detail, including the actions taken by President Washington to retain his slaves in spite of Northern laws. Join us for a lively discussion in which we explore how the story of Ona Judge intersects with the themes of the Civil Rights Movement of the 50s and 60s and today.
